President's Message

At this writing (January 10) the Arizona House has not passed the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). Along with all of you, I am anxiously awaiting the Arizona House vote. But something new is in the offing--a different state may claim the distinction of being the 38th state—Virginia!!!

The Virginia Senate just passed the ERA out of committee. That means we still have another vote in the Virginia Senate. But even if a 38th state ratifies the amendment there will be at least two legal challenges from ERA opponents: (1) the deadline for ratification has passed; and (2) five states have rescinded their ratification.

The Supreme Court has stated that it is within Congress's power to rescind the deadline. And attorneys question whether recension by the five states is legal. Will an additional five states pass the ERA in 2019 to replace the five recensions?

The equal rights amendment, in sum, would dedicate the nation to a new view of the rights and responsibilities of men and women. It firmly rejects sharp legislative lines between the sexes as constitutionally tolerable. Instead, it looks toward a legal system in which each person will be judged on the basis of individual merit and not on the basis of an unalterable trait of birth that bears no necessary relationship to need or ability. (Ruth Bader Gingsburg)

Days for Girls

Come be part of an international project that gives girls the ability to address their menstrual cycle, get an education, retain their dignity and is good for the environment. In many countries, girls miss school each month during their period because they have no feminine hygiene supplies.



And, toilets are clogged and unusable from disposable pads. Each Days for Girls Kit, which lasts up to three years, replaces 360+ disposable pads. In the ten year history of Days for Girls, over a million kits have been assembled worldwide and distributed

In our area, spearheaded by Karen Wilkes, 1,000 kits are being prepared. A project such as this requires many helping hands and donations of supplies and money. The project's participants in our area include groups and individuals from various church, school, and civic organizations, including AAUW. **Sewing is not a requirement to participate!**

The components for these 1,000 kits will be assembled on March 2, 2019 at 2610 Sierra Meadows Drive, Rocklin CA. That will be followed by a presentation by Celeste Mergens, CEO and Founder of Days for Girls.
